Featuring seven up and coming young artists from Hanoi and Saigon, A Snapshot of Vietnamese Contemporary Art places much needed emphasis on a genre which remains relatively unexplored within the art world. Although, often overshadowed by larger, more high-profile countries such as China which continues to garner unprecedented attention for its artistic output over the years, Vietnam has persevered as an uncredited incubator of creativity since Doi Moi, the political and economic renewal of 1986 made its mark on the cultural scene. Shunning academicism and socialist realist propaganda, artists are turning their attention towards new mediums that readily allow them to accurately and effectively cross-examine the country's economic and social climate. Fueled by an insightful analysis of issues that include

environmental problems, corruption, family, communism
and childhood, A Snapshot of
Vietnamese Contemporary Art
encompasses a multiplicity of
different mediums that range
from installation, painting,
video, sculpture and photography. Curated by Marie Terrieux,
artists featured in the exhibition
include Nguyễn Quang Huy,
Nguyễn Minh Phước, Hoàng
Dướng Câm, Richard Streitmatter-Trần and Lễ Huy Hoàng.

ARCHITECTURE OF AUTHORITY: PHOTOGRAPHS BY RICHARD ROSS

What do prisons, courtrooms, pre-school classrooms and telephone booths have in common? They all embody what photographer Richard Ross terms as 'asymmetrical architecture' - or spaces that exert power over individuals. Featuring 44 large-format color photographs by Ross, the exhibition, Architecture of Authority: Photographs by Richard Ross aims to showcase the beauty of imposing spaces by focusing on architectural and design traits which have been deposed to allude to a sense of power and authority in a range of buildings. No stranger to sites associated with surveillance, repression and control. Ross was the official photographer documenting the restoration of the J. Paul Getty Museum and has an extensive exhibition record in the United States and Europe. EPAIN CAI GUO-GIANG: I WANT TO BELIEVE

Born in 1957, the enigmatic Cai Guo-Qiang is often regarded as the most prolific Chinese artist of his generation. I Want to Believe, his full-fledged, conceptually-driven retrospective for the Guggenheim Museum Bilbao successfully incorporates ideas of transformation, expenditure of materials and connectivity in order to reintroduce the art medium as a process which unfolds in time and space. Utilizing ancient Chinese culture. modern Maoist revolutionary tactics and the contemporary art scene as fodder for his practice, Cai's frequently revisited themes include creation and destruction. His notorious use of gunpowder to create largescale 'gunpowder drawings' spur on consistent references to Taoist cosmology, extraterrestrial observations, pyrotechnic technology as well as the jolting contemporary issue of
